Historical Yummy

There's something romantic about the term "enthralled." It speaks to awe, delight, or fascination. But the word's root, "thrall," is derived from Old Norse and means "slave." In Viking days between the 8th and 11th centuries, the Norse dominated the European slave trade and just about every society in Europe and North Africa held a lot of people "enthralled."

In the 9th century, Christianity was also spreading relentlessly north. One convert to the new religion was "*Aud the Deep Minded*" who thought very differently from those around her.

Aud was married to the son of the Viking king in charge of the Viking's newly established slave trading port at Dublin. After her husband was killed in battle, Aud accompanied her son when he successfully conquered much of Scotland. But he was later killed in a revolt that left her stranded in a hostile country. Under Aud's capable direction, her followers and slaves secretly built a large ferry ship in the forest enabling her to escape Scotland with her grandchildren, entourage, slaves and significant wealth.

Captaining her ship, Aud fled to Iceland, where two of her brothers lived. At the new settlement she founded, the pious Aud built crosses on several hills overlooking the sea where she worshiped in her still unpopular religion. In another uncommon move, she freed her slaves after her farmstead was built, giving them and her crew land in thanks for their loyalty and service.

Aud was both a slaveholder and freer of slaves. Of the two truths, it was her act of conscience that earned her place in history.



Mother Daughter Traitor Spy by

Susan Elia MacNeal is based on the true story of a young woman and her mother in 1940 Los Angeles. World War II was underway overseas but the U.S. was resistant to entering the fray. Nazis in America were openly recruiting.

In this charged setting, recent college grad Veronica finds herself blackballed from the career in New York journalism she'd dreamed of.



She and her widowed mother, Violet, both of German descent, move to Los Angeles where blonde, blue-eyed Veronica gets a job as a typist only to discover she's working for a vicious propagandist looking to promote the Nazi cause. With the help and encouragement of a friend of her Navy commander father, Veronica keeps her job and becomes an informant. Soon her mother joins her in socializing with the Nazis in their clandestine effort to gather enough proof of the Nazis' danger to force the disinterested FBI into action.

Excellently written, this novel is suspenseful and inspiring. These two real women acted with bravery and principle in circumstances where those in power ignored the danger of the violence inherent in fascist ideology.
